GOSPEL OF LUKE HANDOUT

THE GOSPEL AS PROPHETIC FULFILLMENT: JOY FOR HUMANKIND & SOCIETY

In many ways Luke presents Jesus' life as a commentary of Isaiah 61:1-2. A comparison of Isaiah and Luke shows important distinctions.

Why would Luke omit "the day of vengeance of our God" (Isa. 61:2)? Luke is emphasizing the current era as the "year of the Lord's favor" (Luke 4:19), referring to the Year of Jubilee where debts are cancelled, property restored, and slaves are freed.

When Jesus says "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4:21), He firmly announces Himself as the Anointed One, the Messiah! As such, He can bring about all joys, freedoms, and restorations – not just for individuals, but for society as a whole!

This means the gospel is BOTH <u>spiritually and socially concerned</u>.

- The **"poor"** (needy, impoverished, disenfranchised, oppressed) hear the Good News of salvation & deliverance.
- The **"broken hearted"** (grieved, disappointed, lonely, and those with shattered relationships) receiving **healing**.
- The "captives" (the socially ensnared or incarcerated, or the demonically tormented or bound) hear of possible deliverance.
- The **"blind"** (physically impaired, prejudicially insensitive, hopeless, or lacking vision/direction) may have recovery of **sight**.
- The **"oppressed"** (bruised by societal pressures, beaten down by circumstance, wounded from destructive encounters) can be **set free**.

KEY ACTIONS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Luke specifically mentions the Spirit 17 times & has 3x more references to the Spirit than any other gospel. One job of the Holy Spirit is to anoint. Let's clarify a bit what that means:

<u>Anointing</u> = setting someone apart, authorizing & equipping him/her for a task of spiritual importance

- Jesus anointed by the Spirit for the ministry of preaching, healing, & deliverance
- Christians anointed by the Spirit for ministry in Christ's name (which includes all the things Jesus did)

Four Actions of the Holy Spirit in Luke

- 1. <u>FAITHFULNESS</u> -- lives of people connected with John the Baptist & Jesus' birth; John the Baptist's fulfillment of ministry under the anointing of the Spirit
- 2. <u>MINISTRY</u> ability for Jesus to complete His unique ministry as the Messiah; power for believers to fulfill their ministry as witnesses
- 3. <u>PRAYER</u> empowering Jesus to pray before, during, & after critical events (Luke 3:21; 6:12; 9:18, 28; 10:21); empowers our prayers as believers & connect Christ's ministry to ours
- 4. JOY spreading joy to Jesus & the church (Luke 10:17, 21; 24:49-53)
